Fourth Sunday of Advent

1st Reading: 2 Sm 7:1-5, 8b-12, 14a, 16 Responsorial Psalm:Ps 89:2-3, 4-5, 27, 29 Second Reading:Rom 16:25-27 Gospel:Lk 1:26-38

Today is a very busy liturgical day! In the morning we celebrate the Fourth Sunday of Advent, and later in the day we celebrate the Christmas Eve Vigil. There is no Fourth week of Advent because we will enter the Christmas season. On Sunday morning the fourth candle is lit on the Advent wreath representing Love. On this fourth Sunday of Advent, the liturgy shifts our attention from John the Baptist to Mary, the mother of Jesus. We are familiar with the story of the Annunciation, when God announced the birth of Jesus as we make our final preparations for our celebration of the Incarnation. The angel Gabriel visited Mary, a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph. Mary greeted the angel's news with awe and wonder and asked how it could be possible that she could give birth to a child. In his reply, the angel Gabriel announced the seemingly impossible reality: the child to be born would be conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and would be God's own Son. Mary's response to the angel, which is called her fiat, is an example of complete faith and obedience to God.

Mary's example of faith and obedience to God, traits which permitted her to receive the angel's message that God's Son would be born as a human person, as one of us.

At this time, we rejoice in the endless love that God has for us, which is made apparent in the birth of his Son. We reflect on the good news of God's love divine brought to us from the angel Gabriel.

Becoming Missionary Disciples- The challenges of faith is to recognize God's plan for us and to remain open to God's will and God's actions in our world. Filled with God's grace, Mary models for us the kind of faith that is needed to cooperate in God's plan of salvation. Like Mary, we are given the awesome opportunity to cooperate in God's saving plan. On this final Sunday of Advent, our Gospel invites us to consider how our preparations for Christmas have made us more aware of God's grace working in our lives.

Visio Divina - Reflective prayer through Sacred Art

Adoration of the Shepherds by Gerard von Honthorst in 1622, captures the beauty of the Light Divine in the Holy Child. The painting is intensely quiet. This scene of meditation invites the viewer to adoration. As Mary teaches the shepherds, she teaches us, inviting us to adore the child,too. .<u>Visit this piece of Sacred Art</u> and take time to notice all that is happening.

Sit with the picture. Spend some time in your own adoration.

- Where do you focus when you look at the painting?
- Are you drawn to a particular person in the painting?
- Who are you in the painting?
- This is a quiet painting but if they were to speak, what would Mary, Joseph, the shepherds or Jesus say to you?

Lighting the Fourth Candle of Advent

The fourth candle of Advent represents Love, the ultimate love of God that He might send His only Son for us. Called the "Angel's Candle," the fourth candle of Advent is lit the Sunday before Christmas, and it is the color purple.

*light all four candles

*Scripture Reflection: "And the angel said to them, "Be not afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which will come to all the people; for to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." Luke 2:10-11

*pause for reflection

*Advent Wreath Prayer: Dear Jesus, may the light of your love always shine in our hearts. As Christmas draws closer, we marvel at your great love for us. Let your love transform every aspect of our lives and touch everyone we encounter. Our hearts are open to you, Jesus. Amen.
